—The board of selectmen were in Boston Tuesday attending the hearing on the National Bank tax bill. Stockholders of national banks claim they have been taxed illegally for the last five years. Should the United States Supreme court rule for the stockholders on the grounds that the tax improperly was levied, the different municipalities will have to refund the tax money which has been paid. According to the selectmen, this would mean that in Southbridge approximately \$63,000 would have to be returned, about \$10,000 to Southbridge stockholders and some \$23,000 to out-of-town stockholders.
