## A different look at America while traveling abroad

when you run into someone and they've never met an American before, and they decide, halfway into a conversation, to say: "I just have to tell you, I am not such a big fan of America," then you sort of don't know what to say.

That's actually only happened to me a handful of times, and it wasn't at the movie premiere, where, for the most part, interesting discussion took place. And when someone brings up questions or things they dislike about America, it can provide an opportunity to open dialogue to widen both their perspective and mine.

But sometimes it can be difficult to get someone to understand: well, just because I'm here right now doesn't mean I'm disowning my country.

It takes a bit of citizen-to-citizen diplomacy.

I don't get too upset, really, because it never helps the situation, and I know that people often have well-founded reasons for not liking things (and, the U.S. is far from perfect). But I try to tell them, in a polite way, that although I frequently criticize my own government, that for me, it comes from a place of wanting the country to be better because I actually like it ... not because I dislike it, too.

Yet when I'm confronted like that, I never feel more American. Sometimes I think that living outside the U.S. will do one of two things: make you stay outside the U.S. because you agree with what people are saying against it, or make you feel more American than ever.

Two extremes.

But I've clearly found the one that I fall under.
